Blue Box



- You can mix papers and containers in the same Blue Box.
- Use Blue Boxes only. Recyclables in plastic bags, cardboard boxes, grocery bins, laundry baskets, milk crates, or garbage/recycling cans will not be collected.
- Place acceptable materials loose in your Blue Box. Rinse all containers and ensure they are clean. Papers can be bundled and tied, but no plastic bags.



General Information

Blue Box material, bundled cardboard and garbage is collected twice a week on Tuesday and Friday.

- Keep your street clean; don't put waste out too early. Place your waste at the curb by 7 a.m. the morning of your collection day, but no sooner than 5 p.m. the evening before.
- Winter safety. Ensure material is free of snow and ice and is visible to the collection crew. Do not place material on top of snow banks.
- Due to the following holidays, your Tuesday waste collection will take place on Wednesday:
 - Family Day (Monday, February 16, 2015)
- Labour Day (Monday, September 7, 2015)
- Victoria Day (Monday, May 18, 2015)
- Thanksgiving (Monday, October 12, 2015)
- Civic Holiday (Monday, August 3, 2015)
- Family Day (Monday, February 15, 2016)
- Due to the following holidays, your Friday waste collection will take place on the Thursday before:
 - Good Friday (Friday, April 3, 2015)
- New Year's Day (Friday, January 1, 2016)
- Christmas Day (Friday, December 25, 2015) Good Friday (Friday, March 25, 2016)



Cardboard

- Flatten all cardboard.
- Tie flattened cardboard in bundles or place flattened cardboard inside a cardboard box, both no larger than 90 cm x 90 cm x 30 cm (3 ft x 3 ft x 1 ft). Place beside your Blue Box.



- Use Blue Boxes only. Materials in plastic bags or other containers will not be collected.
- Please see the back page for Blue Box acceptable materials.



Garbage

- Businesses may place out a maximum limit of six (6) garbage bags/cans per business.
- Bags and cans must be no heavier than 23 kg (50 lbs).
- Garbage bags and cans must not be larger than a standard container of 125 L (27 imperial gallons).
- On garbage day, only regular household and office-related garbage placed into a standard garbage bag or standard container will be collected. Large bulky items will not be collected.
- Keep our sidewalks clean. If you have messy materials, double bag them or use a garbage container. When appropriate, rinse out garbage items.
- Shredded paper will not be collected with your Blue Box.
